For Parents

This book provides a great opportunity for you to talk to kids about good character!

Ask your child how Puppy Jake is showing character in the pictures in this book.

Trustworthiness

- Jake is being trustworthy by staying inside of his yard. He is also being loyal.
- Ask your child about times when they do what they say they will do. Tell them about a time when you found it difficult to follow through on a promise.

Respect

- Jake is showing respect to all animals, even the ones who are different than him.
- Discuss the difference between admiring someone and showing respect. We show respect to everyone, even if we don't admire them or agree with their beliefs.

Responsibility

- Jake is showing responsibility by using self-control and not eating the steak.
- Talk to your child about doing their best. Ask if they have better results when they do their best with a positive attitude or when they do their best with a negative attitude.

Fairness

- Jake is showing fairness by sharing a stick.
- Fair doesn't always mean equal. Give your child examples of when people are given what they need, rather than equal amounts.

Caring

- Jake is being caring by helping others.
- Ask your child about friendships. Do they try hard to be a good friend?

Citizenship

- Jake is practicing good citizenship by helping take care of his community.
- Discuss things in your community, classroom, or school that could be improved. Then talk about how you can help make it happen.





10 Ways To Teach Kids About Character

Good character doesn't just happen. It is a result of parents who intentionally teach their children about character. Here are 10 tips to help you get started:

- #1 Be a good role model. Remember, your kids are always watching.
- #2 Give children praise when you see good behavior.
- #3 Develop family rules and consequences. Explain them ahead of time and then use the consequences in a consistent way.
- #4 You can use life's everyday habits and routines to teach your child about character. Books and movies provide great opportunities to have discussions with your children. For example, discuss how a character in the book demonstrated honesty or responsibility.
- #5 Teach your children the Golden Rule: Treat others the way you want to be treated.
- #6 Have a family plan to regularly protect and conserve resources. For example: recycle, plant trees, don't litter.
- #7 Do something as a family that shows caring for someone in need. Take your children along with you when you volunteer.
- #8 Teach your child how to do a chore and give them a deadline to complete it. Expect your child to be responsible for doing the task and thank them after they do it.
- #9 Embrace diversity and cooperation with individuals that are ethnically and culturally different.
- #10 Consistently ask how choices impact the feelings of others. Help him or her to see the relationship between their actions and the feelings of others.

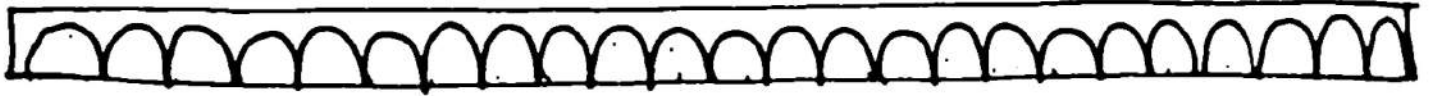

10 Ways To Show Your Dog Respect

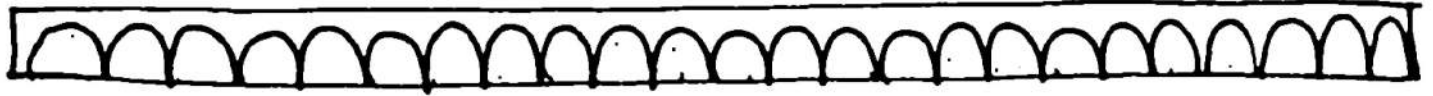
- #1 Be kind and loving.
- #2 Take your dog for a nice walk.
- #3 Feed him regularly.
- #4 Throw a tennis ball for exercise.
- #5 Brush your dog once a week.
- #6 Remember the appointments with the veterinarian.
- #7 Teach your dog basic obedience (sit, lay down, stay).
- #8 Always watch your puppy and kennel them when you're not available.
- #9 Brush your dog's teeth.
- #10 Remember heartworm and flea medications.

- #1 A dog with a vest on is working so please don't pet him.
- #2 Working dogs aren't allowed to accept food or treats from anyone but their owner.
- #3 Tell your friends how important a service dog is and why.
- #4 Explain to family and friends what a service dog does to help his owner.
- #5 Volunteer to help Puppy Jake Foundation to work and train the puppies.





Puppy Jake Foundation

Puppy Jake Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that is dedicated to raising well bred and professionally trained service dogs for wounded military veterans.

The service dogs assist veterans that suffer from invisible injuries such as Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and/or mobility impairments. The Foundation raises these dogs for two years with a rigorous schedule for both dogs and foster families. The training team must pass monthly evaluations in the classroom and milestones need to be met in group outings in every day situations. The dogs begin their training just as soon as they enter the program at 8 weeks of age. The program currently includes Labrador Retrievers, Golden Retrievers and German Shepherds.

Puppy Jake Foundation is committed to helping our country's wounded veterans that have given so selflessly to our nation. The service dogs truly change an individual's life by allowing them more independence and freedom. The service dogs are provided at no charge to the veteran.

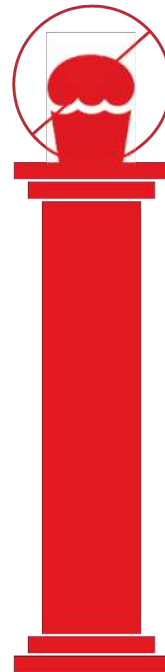
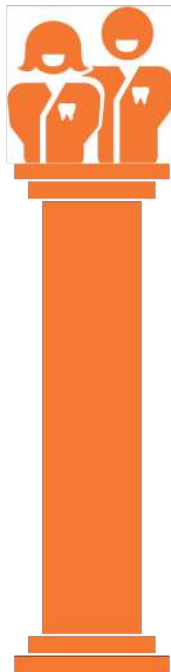
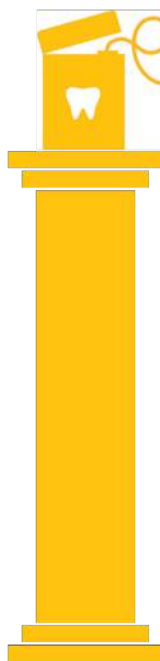
